Leo XIV to make St John Henry Newman a Doctor of the Church.

Pope Leo will proclaim his first Doctor of the Church by elevating St John Henry Newman to a title that recognises the importance of his thinking to the theology of the Catholic Church. Only the 38th person to be given this honour.

A Doctor of the Church is a person whose teachings about Catholicism, whether through writing, study or research, have been deemed of great significance to the Church and to the Catholic faith.

Born in London in 1801, John Henry Newman was educated at Oxford, and became an Anglican priest in 1825. He converted to Catholicism in 1845. Ordained as a Catholic priest in Rome in 1846, he was created a Cardinal in 1879.

Newman was committed to Catholic education and was a key figure in the creation of the Catholic University of Ireland, subsequently University College of Dublin, of which he became the first rector in 1854. In 1859, he established the Oratory School in Birmingham.

Madonna begs Pope Leo on Instagram

The Pop Star Madonna has called on Pope Leo to visit Gaza in order to "bring your light to the children before it's too late". Madonna, considered one of the most successful female solo acts of all time, who was born and raised a Catholic, shared her plea on Instagram.

"Most Holy Father, please go to Gaza and bring your light to the children before it's too late". She added "You are the only one of us who cannot be denied entry. We need the humanitarian gates to be fully opened to save these innocent children".

Canonisations - September 7th 2025

On Sunday, the area around St. Peter's Square was filled from early in the morning with banners, singing, and prayers in many languages accompanying the first canonisations of Pope Leo XIV's pontificate. Many of the participants were young people who see the new saints, Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati, as role models who speak directly to their hearts. "Both were pretty normal guys like us; they really enjoyed life and lived it to the fullest; they knew how to do it the right way. That's a great example for us," said one of the students in St. Paul's Square. "I'm deeply inspired by how he used the internet, something so common in our lives, to talk about God," Another student, confessed that learning about Frassati's life changed his perspective on holiness: "I've read that Frassati wasn't a good student. In other words, you don't have to be perfect to be a saint."
