Media

In a world marked by divisions and by the emergence of artificial intelligence, Pope Leo XIV urged those who work in Catholic media and communications to give space to the stories of people who are suffering and who are working for peace.

"I encourage you to be sowers of good words, amplifiers of voices that courageously seek reconciliation by disarming hearts of hatred and fanaticism," he said, in a message released on Wednesday, January 21, signed by Cardinal Secretary of State Pietro Parolin and addressed to the French Catholic Media Federation.

"In a fragmented and polarised world, be the antennae that pick up and relay what the weak, marginalised, lonely, and those who need to know the joy of feeling loved, are experiencing," said the Pope.

The message was sent on the occasion of the 29th edition of the Days of St. Francis de Sales, taking place in Lourdes on January 21-23. Every year the Fédération des Médias Catholiques organizes this event, which brings together journalists from all over the world to reflect on the mission of Catholic media and communications. St. Francis de Sales is the patron saint of the Catholic press.

Ukraine

The light of a candle softly outlines the face of a mother holding her baby, wrapped in many blankets that conceal his features. It might seem like an image full of tenderness, yet it reveals the tragedy of the Ukrainian people, who for four years have known no peace.

The Ukrainian people now live in darkness, with temperatures well below zero, without heating, without electricity, because of intense Russian raids on the capital, Kyiv — the latest carried out overnight.

Cardinal Konrad Krajewski, the Prefect of the Dicastery for the Service of Charity, the Pope's Almoner, launched a heartfelt appeal for the country "martyred" by war, which he has visited at least ten times on behalf of the Holy See.

The Polish-born Cardinal has made numerous journeys to deliver food, power generators, and even ambulances, expressing the Church's closeness through concrete action as well as prayerful support.

Pray for Peace

A statue of St. Carlo Acutis has been inaugurated in Myanmar, and a diocesan priest describes it as offering an example to young people on how to live their faith, "even in times of trial, especially during this difficult time the nation is experiencing." The statue is meant to serve as a reminder and inspiration for young people on how to live their faith in Myanmar through a proper use of the internet and social media.

As St. Carlo is the patron of the internet, Fr. Htoi described him as an example for young people in the country who "must navigate and survive this crisis affecting a country torn apart by civil war."
